


We set out to engage community leaders across the Van Buren area to help them begin to think longer term about community recovery.

Finding a "new normal"

Key questions considered

- 1. What is making it difficult for individuals and families to rebuild their lives here?
- 2. What could help those who choose to stay to not just survive but thrive?
- 3. What does the Van Buren community want to rebuild itself into? (the "new normal")
- 4. What might the journey to the new normal look like? How long will it take?
- 5. Who are the community and project champions who can help lead the way?



Inputs to the Roadmap to Recovery Project



We initially thought we could identify unmet needs from public forums. Instead, we had to become "disaster detectives".

Learning from Disaster: The Ozark Floods of 2017



We learned that, for small communities, it may take 5-10 years or more to rebuild decades worth of community assets and infrastructure.

Stages of Long Term Disaster Recovery

Stage 0: Relief

Stage 1: Individual Recovery

STARTS 3-6 months after event

Stage 2: Community Recovery

STARTS 6-12 months after event

Stage 3: Rebuild Infrastructure
STARTS 12-24 months after event

Primary

Goal

Coordinate and allocate outside resources to meet the basic needs of individuals and families

Thrive

Enable individuals and families to support themselves and their community, and prosper here

Sustain

Community development to rebuild infrastructure and improve resiliency and self sufficiency in future disasters

Focus Areas

Commitment to Strategic Planning? Not without capacity.



Exhausted community leaders do not have the capacity for strategic planning if immediate needs are too overwhelming.

Strategic Few have the ability to think In small communities, leaders ahead and plan for the future, have to do all three **Thinking** even on their best day... The future doesn't matter if they can't fix today's problems "All hands on deck" approach **Problem** leaves them too exhausted to think Some people are able to help strategically solve difficult problems and Solving They often lack peer-to-peer figure out what to do... support from those who have been through this before Even when there are teams of Many people volunteer Doing volunteers, keeping them to help, but need to be motivated and productive can be told what to do... challenging

After nearly a year, there was enough capacity to get started




Engaging the broader Community

Survey conducted April-May 2018, one year after the flood. Received 221 responses.


How did the survey get distributed?

Age of Survey Respondents




Home Zip Code of Survey Respondents





We got responses from many different groups with ties to the community.


How would you describe your connection(s) to the Van Buren area? (select all that apply)





The majority of survey respondents had family or close friends that suffered devastating losses, even if they weren't personally affected.


Which of the following statements describe how you were personally affected by the spring 2017 flooding in Van Buren? (select all that apply)

To understand residents and tourists overall perception of the area after the flood, we used a metric used by marketers to measure brand strength and customer loyalty.



How likely would you be to recommend Van Buren to family and friends as a...?





Local leaders are the strongest promoters of the community as a place to live. Tourists think it's a good place to visit but wouldn't want to live here.









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





What Comes Next? Ozark Vitality's Tourism Expansion Project

Two-year \$400,000* economic recovery project to expand tourism and improve career opportunities for digital professionals in the Ozarks.

Project Goals

- Change perception from 3month to year-round tourism
- Attract wider range of tourists
- Increase tourists' length of stay and \$ spend in region
- Enable more businesses to stay open year-round
- Increase **year-round jobs**
- Increase local talent and capabilities in digital media

How will we do it?

- Bring in established filmmakers to produce short documentary films
- Hire local artists & videographers to support them and learn
- Integrate films into regional branding and national tourism marketing campaigns
- Offer national-quality marketing professional development in region




